

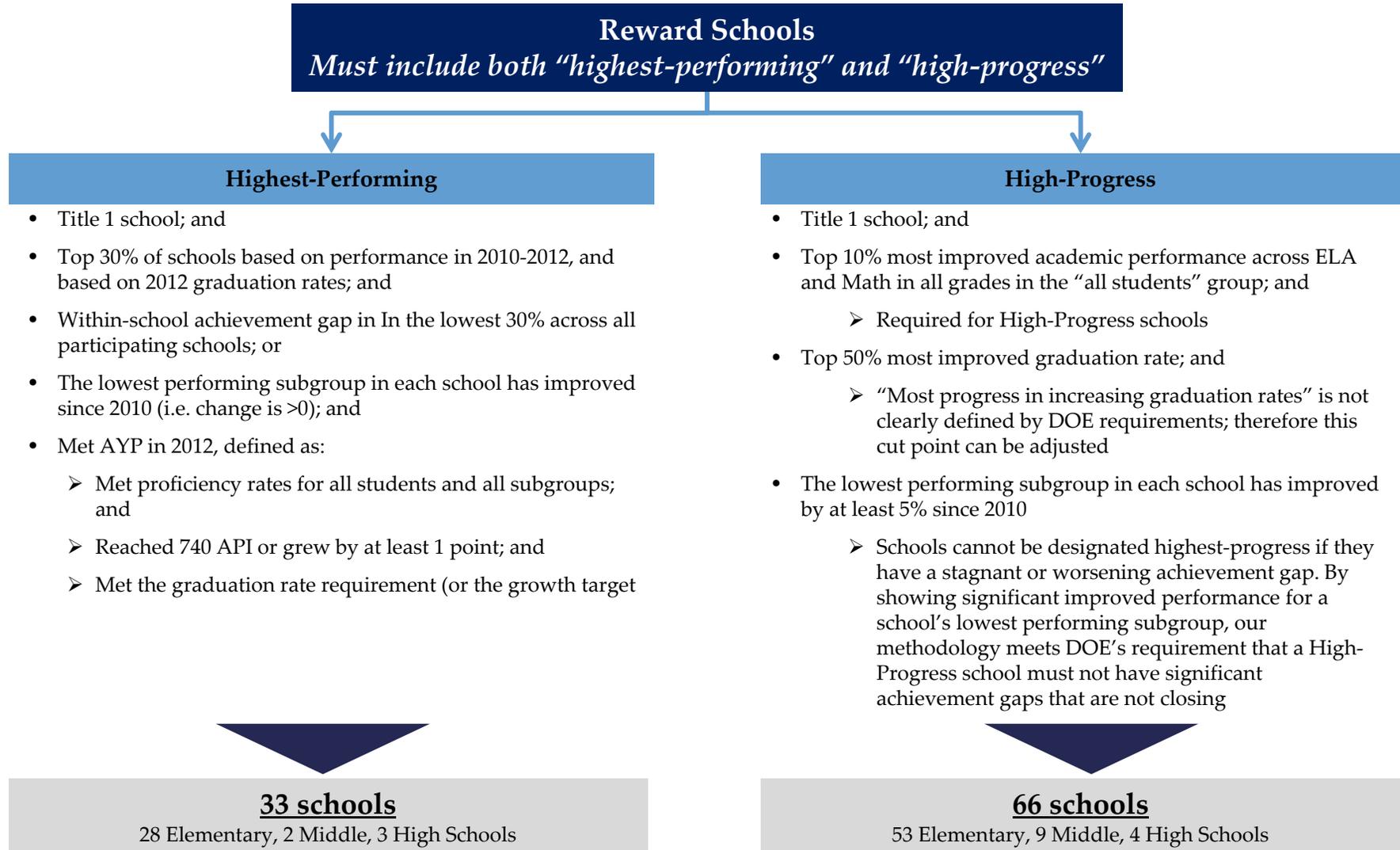

# Priority schools have the most stringent required interventions; Reward schools recognize both high progress and highest-performing schools

<b>USED Description</b>	<p>Highest-Performing Schools:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Are among schools with the highest absolute performance over a number of years for the “all student” groups and all subgroups</li> <li>• At the high school level, must have the highest graduation rates</li> <li>• Must be making AYP for “all students” and all subgroups</li> <li>• Cannot have significant achievement gaps that are not closing</li> </ul>	<p>High-Progress Reward Schools:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Are among the top 10% of CORE schools in improving performance over a number of years</li> <li>• Cannot have significant achievement gaps that are not closing</li> </ul>	<p>Focus Schools must include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Any high schools with &lt;60% graduation rates not designated a Priority School</li> <li>• Title 1 schools with the largest within-school achievement gaps in performance or graduation rates</li> <li>• A Title 1 school with at least 1 low performing subgroup over a number of years</li> </ul>	<p>A Priority School must be <u>one</u> of the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A currently-served Title 1 and non-Title 1 SIG School</li> <li>• Title 1 eligible or participating school with &lt;60% graduation over a number of years</li> <li>• Among the lowest 5% of schools in CORE based on student achievement in the “all students” group</li> </ul>

# Reward Schools are comprised of both high-performing and high-progress; our definition closely follows the requirements of the waiver



Note: If a school meets criteria for both highest-performing and high-progress, they are included only in the highest-performing list

# The overall lowest performing schools and SIG schools are designated as priority. Schools with large, persistent achievement gaps are designated as focus

## 1 Priority Schools

SIG

- 42 Tier I or Tier II SIG Schools (includes 4 non-Title I)

Performance

- 12 schools in the lowest 5% of based upon proficiency rates of the "all students" group (Lowest 5% for 2012, 2011; lowest 10% for 2010)

Graduation Rate

- 4 **incremental** schools have a graduation rate of <60% for last 3 years

Excludes all

- Credit recovery programs
- Independent study schools
- Schools for students with severe disabilities
- Early education programs

5% (49 schools) are required to be listed as priority

**42 + 12 + 4 = 58 Schools**

## 2 Focus schools (Schools not already designated priority)

Graduation Rate

- 0 schools with a graduation rate of < 60%

Achievement Gap

- **Schools ranked by Achievement Gap**
- 12 schools in the lowest 5% of based upon their achievement gap (lowest 5% for 2012, 2011, and 2010)

Subgroup Performance

- 103 schools with subgroups at less than 20% average proficiency on math and ELA assessments and less than 5 percentage points of improvement over 3 years

10% (99 schools) are required to be listed as focus

# School Designation Detailed Methodology

## Reward

**Identify the “highest-performing schools” and “high-progress schools” based in all-students group over a number of years to recognize achievement and mentor lower-performing schools**

### ***Highest-performing (Title I schools):***

- Top 30% of schools based on average ELA and Math performance of the all students group (percent proficient and above) in each of the years 2010 through 2012 and on 2012 graduation rates (for schools with graduation rate data); and
- Within-school achievement gap (as defined in focus schools section) in the lowest 30% across all participating schools for 2012; or
- The lowest performing subgroup in each school has improved from 2010 to 2012 (i.e. change is >0); and
- Met CA AYP in 2012, defined as the following, per AYP guidelines:
  - Met proficiency rates for all students and all subgroups; and
  - Reached 740 API or grew by at least 1 point; and
  - Met the graduation rate requirement (or the growth target)

### ***High-progress (Title I schools):***

- Top 10% most improved academic performance from 2010 to 2012 across average ELA and Math in all grades in the “all students” group (percent proficient and above) and
- Top 50% most improved graduation rate from 2010 to 2012; and
- The lowest performing subgroup in each school has improved by at least 5% from 2010 to 2012
  - Schools cannot be designated highest-progress if they have a stagnant or worsening achievement gap. By showing significant improved performance for a school’s lowest performing subgroup, our methodology meets USED’s requirement that a High-Progress school must not have significant achievement gaps that are not closing

**Before finalization, superintendents were asked to review lists and identify schools that should be excluded (e.g., credit recovery programs, independent study schools, schools for students with severe disabilities, early education programs)**
